Rhythm Sticks

Rhythm is fundamental to all music and to all forms of learning.

Rhythm is everywhere in the life of a child, from hopping and jumping to skipping.

So it's wonderful when children learn how their own physical energy

can be ordered and combined with others

in rhythmic chanting, singing, movement and instrumental playing.

THIS 2 PART COURSE offers you the opportunity to explore everything you always wanted to know about rhythm and how to teach it.

Integrate Rhythm into All Learning

In addition to exploring worlds of rhythm in the realm of the music lesson, the course will also explore rhythm's intrinsic relationship with other subjects and capacities, e.g.

- the relationship between music and maths
- the linguistic use of rhymes, speech rounds and play ground chants to create rhythms
- the way rhythm helps to develop children's memories and concentration.

Developing Co-ordination

There'll be loads of joyful rhythm games to help develop children's co-ordination between their left and right arms/legs, and the left and right hemispheres of their brain.

Teaching Rhythm through Movement

In many cultures music and dance are so inseparable that they share the same word. Thus African musicians say 'counting is for people who don't dance'. So come and explore

- i) an amazing Samoan canoeing chant which demonstrates how work rhythms linked to chanting helps inculcate a strong sense of rhythm into the whole human being.
- ii) traditional English Morris Dancing with sticks to help develop a wonderful sense of right and left balance and the co-ordination of beats/durations with others.

Holistic Rhythm Teaching Skills from Body Orchestration to Movement Words

Michael is an expert in rhythm learning systems. He will introduce you to:

- i) his innovative 'Movement Words' system where each rhythm mnemonic is associated with specific rhythms, and directly conveys the link between duration and movement.
- ii) How to Create Body Percussion/Orchestration using the whole body to learn rhythms via the feet, laps, different forms of clapping and finger clicks, etc.

- Other kinds of rhythm not based on any pulse from nature's rhythms to breath/phrasing time, namely the 'figural' rhythms that characterise early childhood
- How different metres evoke different kinds of time from circular to linear time
- How some musics live in the lightness of the upbeat and others dwell in the weight of the downbeat
 Why some metres were called 'perfect' and others 'imperfect'?

Part 2 will cover all the rhythm essentials for teaching and getting inside the very embodied / energetic grooves found in world and contemporary musics.
