Song Circle for Men's Voices

'Why don't men sing today?' 'Where are all the men in choirs?'

These are the cries that are frequently heard today from women in choirs.

Of course there are wonderful examples of male voice choirs, from Barbershop to Welsh Male Voice Choirs.

But in spite of the close harmony and the deep sense of kinship men find in these choirs, the idioms (and the concert dress) don't appeal to lots of men.

Typically men love team work - especially when it includes physicality (witness all the sports men participate in). So choir singing should be ideal for men, shouldn't it?

Yet there is a lot of uncertainty about the value of male singing in the world today (just as there is uncertainty about male identity). In Britain we have a deeply ingrained attitude about men's singing, which often views it as soft and whimpish (in spite of men traditionally singing in the mining valleys of Wales, singing their heads off at football matches, and embodying the wild man masculinity of rock music).

A further reason for the decline in men's singing is that the change of voice in a boy's adolescence is a 'rite of passage' that is seldom met with appropriate vocal methodologies-let alone appropriate emotional and psychological support.

All of this means boys and men seldom discover the full potential of their voices.

But just as men's voices have a totally different tone quality to women's, so do their feelings. Thus they often have different musical tastes, respond to different types of imagery in songs, and search for different forms of leadership. (N.B. Thus in many indigenous cultures men and women sing gender specific music.)

So just as there has been a huge growth in men's groups - inspired by key figures such as Robert Bly and Steve Biddulph - so we need a new vision of men's singing, because men frequently respond to singing - and participation in choirs - in different ways than women.

This workshop will therefore address 2 key questions:

- i) How can men believe that singing is a perfectly masculine thing to do?'
 - ii) How can we find an appropriate image of men's singing so that all men feel it's a great thing to do?

So come and discover how to put the 'heart' and the 'body' back into men's voices and explore how to re-connect with parts of the self from which many men have been cut off by virtue of their socio-cultural-musical upbringing.

> Lift Every Voice - A New Vision of Male Voice Singing

What is needed, above all, is for men to come into contact with a singing leader who can inspire them to develop their voices and their love of singing.

It will introduce you to NEW FORMS OF SINGING that all men can respond to. You will find it will bring greater physicality and more elemental qualities into singing, (e.g. through singing more primordial choral traditions), allied to the use humour, and dashes of drama and eccentricity.

N.B. From the outset Michael will establish an atmosphere of safety for you to move your voices from inside to outside without being stopped by the damaging layers of inner critics that often silence us. You will find Tonalis' methods will remove any inhibiting attitudes which often block access to the huge reservoir of musical and vocal potential we each have.
